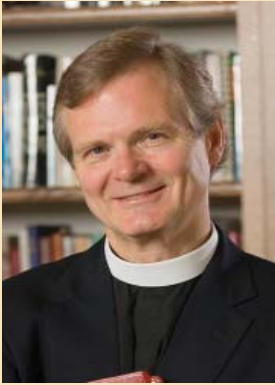


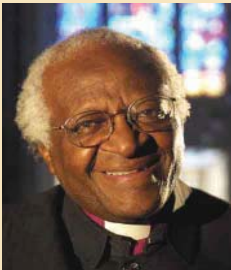

The Very Rev. Samuel Lloyd Returns to St. James'

Sunday, February 21

The Very Rev. Samuel Lloyd, Dean of the Washington National Cathedral, will be our guest preacher on Sunday, February 21. The Rev. Lloyd will be the guest preacher at the 9:10 a.m. and 11:15 a.m. services and will give the 10:30 a.m. forum "Signposts for a 21st Century Church."

Dean Lloyd was installed as the ninth dean of Washington National Cathedral in 2005, charged with leadership of what is widely referred to as "the national house of prayer." He previously served as rector of historic Trinity Church, Copley Square in Boston, Massachusetts, where his work focused on preaching, teaching, and developing Christian community, with emphases on lay leadership, wide-ranging styles of worship, and engagement in a broad array of direct and social justice ministries.

Dean Lloyd began his ministry as an assistant professor of religious studies at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville while also serving as assistant to the rector and chaplain at St. Paul's Memorial Church in Charlottesville. Prior to moving to Boston, Dean Lloyd served at St. Paul and the Redeemer in Chicago and was chaplain of the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee. He holds a Masters of Divinity degree from Virginia Theological Seminary and a Ph.D. in English Literature from the University of Virginia. He also holds an M.A. degree in English Literature from Georgetown University and received his B.A. from the University of Mississippi. He has received honorary Doctor of Divinity degrees from the University of the South and Virginia Theological Seminary.

He currently serves as a regent of the University of the South. His writing and reviews have been published by the Sewanee Theological Review, Forward Movement, Anglican Digest, and Journal of Religion, among others.

The Church and Global Reconciliation

A Panel Discussion for
St. James' Bicentennial

The panel will include the Most Rev. Desmond Mpilo Tutu, Archbishop Emeritus of the Diocese of Capetown, South Africa; the Rt. Rev. Gordon McMullan, retired Bishop of Down and Dromore (Belfast), Northern Ireland; and the Rt. Rev. Hays H. Rockwell, retired Bishop of Missouri and former Rector of St. James'

While Archbishop Tutu's role in the struggle against his country's apartheid regime and in the subsequent efforts at reconciliation between the polarized populations there are well known, Bishop McMullan had a similar impact in Belfast during the worst years of "the Troubles" with his efforts at reconciliation between Northern Ireland's Protestants and Roman Catholics. In the late 1970s and early 1980s, during Bishop Rockwell's tenure as Rector of St. James', he established personal and faith relationships with Tutu and McMullan that led to regular presences at the parish by both men, and the parish's moral and financial support for their reconciliation efforts. In fact, Bishop McMullan has spent time here every year since then, most recently in month-long visits as Bishop-in-Residence.

These three great friends will discuss the ways in which a local congregation can be called to participate in global reconciliation efforts, challenging us all to think about further ways to involve ourselves through faith in the work of healing the divisions between God's people.
